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Prerequisites:

Art Appreciation and sophomore status or above

Course Description:

This course explores the elements and principles of art, the basic language of art, in applied to drawing, design, pottery and computer application. The students will gain an appreciation of art through the exploration of drawing, design, computers and pottery techniques. The primary focus of this class is to explore visual arts through a project based curriculum, as well as make connections to reading, writing, discussion, observation reflection and critique.
